Nonetheless, in the region who cares? Considering the only fact that 'if you got not enough marks, you would not be qualified to get a position of a better primary school, a famous secondary, a well-known university and ultimately a good job,' parents and teachers, and even students, would not care about what children are learning for and force them (or themselves to be buried into thousands of books.

A text read recently in the Chinese DSE 2015 past paper, named, 'Talking about interest', was found by that some quite interesting points are expressed there. Stating that learning should be for their interest but not for results only, curiosity leads to a reason of learning......I forgot what exactly the text was about, but it eventually reflected the truth that the Hong Kong's educational system is problematic. Honestly I am this kind of persons too, but then I found a problem, short term memory will not last for long, knowledge in your mind then quickly be disintegrated after the recent task. Knowledge, information, texts, no longer exist.

Probably relearning will be the only way to deal with test and examinations, but not revising.

'Practice makes perfect.' Many students practice their answering skills to fight against the tricky questions of HKDSE. However, stepping into the society getting a great job, or entering a great university, what skills and knowledge that you have previously practiced to seemingly perfect, will be fundamental and essential, or even related to your job? Unfortunately, very very little. The real knowledge needed has to be found by yourself.
